A quarter-million swifts roosted in Rainier!

Hats off to Carolyn Norred and her crew of volunteers!

They documented 270,052 Vaux's Swift "roostings" at Riverside Community Church in Rainier during the southbound migration.

The only roost site to beat Rainier was the McNear Brickyard in San Rafael, CA.

Details are below in Larry Schwitters's summary of the count.

Children's Discovery Museum: Discovering a Wonderful World

The Children's Discovery Museum in Longview, http://childrensdiscovery360.org/, is currently closed due to COVID-19, but it is maintaining a presence in the community by offering daily links to websites of interest to kids on its Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/cowlitzcountychildrensmuseum/

These include short presentations, many of them videos, on birds, plants, animals, chemistry, astronomy, and other science as well as stories, songs, experiments and activities, and travel destinations.

Ongoing Citizen Science at home "Project Feeder Watch"

Here is a fun opportunity to participate in bird related research, from the comfort of your home.

The **Project Feeder Watch with Cornell Bird Laboratory** will go from November until April, but one can sign up until the end of February. It runs for 21 weeks and involves counting birds at one's feeders or just in a bird-friendly habitat that one has provided. This is usually done in backyards. Birds are counted for two days every week or two (at least 5 days between a pair of counting days), and the results are submitted to the Laboratory for research and analysis. There is a \$18 participation fee which covers some materials.

You do not have to spend a lot of time watching; some people do it before and after work, or 5 minutes each hour, or whatever structure works for you.

This count will be different because of COVID-19. The guidelines are:

- NO in-person compilation gatherings.
- Social distancing and/or masking are **required** at all times in the field.
- Carpooling may **only** occur within existing familiar or social "pod" groups.
- Activities **must** comply with all current state and municipal COVID-19 guidelines.

Wahkiakum CBC

The Wahkiakum CBC is still on, December 29, 2020.

There are some national standards for the Christmas Bird Count this year due to Covid-19, which we will follow.

Participants should not carpool with people other than their own family group or social pod.

There will be no gathering at the end of the day participants should submit their data via email.


As the Wahkiakum count is generally birding outdoors in a sparsely populated area, the chance of transmitting the virus will be low as long as participants mask up and wash hands for purchasing fuel or food or are otherwise interacting with others.
